

## LEGISLATIVE FACT SHEET

## HB25-1035 | CMP Program Updates

STATUS: This bill has been amended by the Colorado Senate, and the Colorado House is considering the Senate's amendments. Its hearing on March 11th was laid over to March 12, 2025.

**SPONSORS:** Rep. Amy Paschal (D), Sen. Mike Weissman (D)

**SUMMARY:** This bill aims to enhance the coordination and management of services for the CMP program by:

- Expanding the Scope of Managed Care
  Entities: The bill broadens the range of
  managed care entities with which local county
  departments of human services can establish
  MOUs. The bill allows local CMP programs to
  enter into agreements with any Medicaid managed care entities (MCE).
- Access to ISST records: The bill allows the court with the jurisdiction over the relevant case to access records created by an ISST meeting.

**FISCAL NOTES:** This bill is not projected to have any fiscal impact on the state budget. The bill is projected to have a minimal impact on the state workload.

**SUPPORT**: AFSCME, Adams County Board of County Commissioners, Boulder County, Colorado Access, Colorado Counties, Colorado Women's Bar Association, Mesa County Human Services

**OPPOSITION**: There are no organizations registered in opposition to this bill. The Christian Home Educators of Colorado initially took an opposing position against this bill but switched to an amending position.

## **PROS**

- Allowing County Departments of Human Services to expand the scope of CMP to include managed care entities would allow more interagency cooperation between partners that provide critical services to youth & their families.
- Granting courts access to ISST records under their jurisdiction would give courts a more complete picture of a case and could be useful in determining treatment, sentencing, and reentry plans.

## **CONS**

• Some organizations are concerned about court access to ISST records.
